Agency Accomplishments

With the 2022-2023 academic year ending, QU EMS is proud of this year's accomplishments since the program's inaugural year in 2019. QU EMS began with less than 20 members in 2019 and the organization has since expanded to beyond 60 members. We are looking forward to accepting our next Probationary Class in July! Operationally, QU EMS has seen great expansion in service hours to provide much needed coverage for the Quinnipiac Community and we are excited to see it further grow. Some of the accomplishments from the previous years are highlighted below.

• 2022-2023

- Members have volunteered **over 3000 hours** in scheduled shifts and standby events.
- Collaborated with Hartford HealthCare and QU Wellness to host LIFE STAR's Helicopter at Quinnipiac University during Wellness Week.
- Celebrated **a second SUV** being added to our vehicle fleet. It will soon be state certified as an additional BLS First Responder Unit.
- Has been established as an AHA Training Site, certifying new instructors to teach a multitude of courses including: Heartsaver, BLS, ALCS, & PALS.
- Our instructors have delivered courses to **over 500 individuals** in a variety of courses.
- Has integrated the **Responder Admin** software into our agency to facilitate greater efficiency in our operations.
- Conducted the agency's first Mass Casualty Incident (MCI) training on campus.
- Has established **three new committees**: Public Relations, Peer Support, and the Department Store.
 - The Public Relations Committee has given members who strive on social media a place to contribute to agency marketing.
 - The Peer Support Committee is a new initiative to proactively care for members and provide support after critical calls.

 The Department Store has been launched for members & family to purchase QU EMS merchandise to wear while off duty.

• 2021-2022

- Now provides coverage seven days a week for both Hamden campuses.
 - Members have volunteered over 2,000 hours this past year and provided coverage for events like Move-In Weekend, Athletic Event Standbys, and most recently the Commencement ceremonies.
- Trained over 200 students, faculty, and staff, as well as members of the Hamden CERT in CPR, First Aid, and/or Stop the Bleed.
- Hosted several training topics ranging from Burnout in EMS, Cardiac Arrest Intervention Training, Glucometry to Trauma Skills.
- Explored CESI and the new partnership between Quinnipiac University and Hartford Healthcare.
- Received the HEARTSafe Campus Award at the 2022 NCEMSF Conference.
- Acquired an SUV that has been equipped to respond to medical emergencies on both the Mount Carmel and York Hill campuses.
- Established the Auxiliary Program to introduce students to EMS.
- 2020-2021
 - Adopted online training with the start of the pandemic, and many worked as frontline workers back home during the height of the pandemic.
 - Expanded its coverage to the York Hill campus and began to provide coverage on both campuses Thursday-Saturday nights.
 - Launched their first community education class on Stop the Bleed for students, faculty, and staff.
 - Celebrated its first end-of-year banquet with the unveiling of the first EMT of the Year award.

• 2019-2020

• Ran its first shift in November 2019 on the Mount Carmel Campus and began to provide coverage on Mount Carmel Thursday-Saturday nights.

EMT Division

Our EMT division is comprised of over 40 dedicated and hardworking individuals who respond to medical emergencies on both Mount Carmel and York Hill. Every shift at QU EMS is made up of a crew that contains a crew chief with a probationary member or another crew chief. Probationary members are EMTs who were recently accepted into QU EMS. This year, we have expanded our standby coverage to events such Wake the Giant, several athletic events, admitted students' weekend, commencement, and more. We hope to expand our coverage as we see our organization grow.







Auxiliary Division

The Auxiliary Division is run by our Auxiliary Coordinator, Abigail Crowell, and Auxiliary Representative, Camila Grau. This division offers individuals interested in EMS the opportunity to learn about the field and take active roles in the organization and contribute to its success. We have had many speakers come in to talk about their experiences within EMS! Additionally, there is a strong relationship between our Auxiliary Division and our EMT division. This year, our auxiliary members have played the role of patients in mock calls for our EMT division. These scenarios help our auxiliary members develop relationships with our EMTs and provide the EMTs with realistic training scenarios.



Equipment

This year, QU EMS has been fortunate enough to be equipped with adequate tools to better respond to emergency calls on campus. Some of these new additions are our new durable jump bags! These allow our EMTs to easily access the necessary medical supplies to deliver the appropriate care. Our jump bags contain items such as Oxygen tanks, cervical collars, dressings, PPE, and everything else needed for standard BLS care. We have also acquired a new blue Ford SUV! It will soon be state certified as an additional BLS First Responder Unit.








Call Statistics

Figure 1. This graph depicts the number of calls responded to by QU EMS this year based on days of the week. Call numbers are relatively distributed throughout the week with Saturday having the most calls this year.




Figure 2. This graph illustrates response times (time from being dispatched to arrival on scene). The average response time was 3 minutes and 58 seconds. Longer response times may be attributed to calls on the York Hill campus and weather conditions.

Cumulative Hours from 2022-2023

For the Fall 2022 semester, a total of **1,875 hours** were volunteered on shift by QU EMS personnel.

For the Spring 2023 semester, a total of **1,615 hours** were volunteered on shift by QU EMS personnel.

The total number of hours covered during the 2022-2023 academic year was **3,490 hours**, equivalent to roughly **145 days**.

Community Education

One of our goals this year was to expand our community education efforts, and we have accomplished just that. Being recognized as an American Heart Association Training Site this year has allowed us to expand efforts to equip the QU community with lifesaving skills. This designation allows QU EMS to certify new instructors in Basic Life Support (BLS) and introduce new classes such as Advanced Cardiovascular Life Support (ACLS) and Pediatric Advanced Life Support (PALS).











Community Education Cont.

This year alone, we have trained over **500 individuals** through a variety of course offerings: Hands-only CPR, Heartsaver, BLS, ACLS, PALS, and Stop the Bleed. We have also partnered with and delivered these courses to various organizations such as the Second Company Governor's Foot Guard, Middletown Medical Reserve Corps, Quinnipiac Student Nursing Association (QSNA), and Beta Theta Pi. We have an incredible group of instructors who dedicate their time teaching these courses. Their efforts did not go unnoticed at our first inaugural QU Training Site Pinning Ceremony this Spring. This ceremony recognized the commitment of our BLS instructors towards educating the Quinnipiac community.

Trainings



Our Department of Education hopes to expand greater community education efforts as well as education within QU EMS. In addition, we hope to provide our members with more realistic training scenarios that prepare them for calls on campus.

Our Auxiliary Division plans to expand in numbers and network of guest speakers. Additionally, the Auxiliary Division hopes to strengthen the relationship with the EMT division and increase the number of opportunities available for leadership roles.

QU EMS also hopes to promote greater collaboration with additional Connecticut collegiate EMS agencies, especially during EMS Week and at the National Collegiate Emergency Medical Services Foundation (NCEMSF) Conference to bring awareness to all of the amazing work these programs do to keep their campuses safe.

We hope to carry the momentum this year into the upcoming year and strive towards becoming a better organization.
